## What has been happening in Years 3 & 4?

## Year 3

This term has been packed full of exciting activities in Year 3. In English we have focused our topic around The Lorax by Dr Seuss. The children have thought about the characters of the Once-ler and the Lorax and written in the role of each character. They have also made eye-catching posters advertising Thneeds. We ended our topic by using role-play to imagine we were exploring a new forest, only to find a year later it had been chopped down! We then participated in a debate where each group took on a different stance on whether Bracknell Forest should cut down some trees.

In Geography the children enjoyed looking at the new developments in Crowthorne and their impact on the environment. On our recent walk around the village we carried out a traffic survey and explored the local churches.

Our Science topics have been Animals & Humans and Forces & Magnets. The children labelled a human skeleton, as well as identifying different animal skeletons. This half term the children have enjoyed investigating different forces and the properties of magnets. We celebrated our science knowledge with a Year group assembly which showed off our use of thinking maps.

This half term in PE, we have been learning different hockey skills and keeping fit in circuit training. It was great to see the children designing circuits for their families.

We finished our RE topic which focused on Easter, making hot cross buns with the children also designing their own packaging for their hot cross buns.

We welcomed Mrs Jones back from maternity leave and we'll miss Mr Hill and Mrs Holland in 3JM. Wishing you all a very Happy Easter. Have a good rest and see you in the summer term.

### The Daily Mile – All Weather Surface Project

We launched The Daily Mile for all the children and staff in Oaklands Junior School in April last year and have enjoyed the many benefits of it for nearly a year. Without a doubt we have seen these benefits first hand. The children are more alert in lessons and ready to learn, especially on a Monday morning! We have seen physical improvements in events such as cross country, and for those who are not sporty it has been great to see them exercising when running or walking. One of the added benefits is the chance to socialise with other year groups and classes and for teachers to chat to children in a way that there is rarely time to in class, helping to meet some of their emotional and social needs.

We have a fantastic and interesting wiggly track painted on our field that the children and staff love using. However, we have been unable to use it throughout the winter and instead have had to use the smaller playground. We would really like to provide an all-weather surface for our fantastic track on the field, in order that we can use it all year round.

We are planning some fundraising events in the summer term to help raise money for this but are also looking for help with sponsorship to finance this project.

If you are able to help or know of anyone in our local community who could help us please let Mrs Alexander, our PE subject lead, know. We would love to see the track used to its full capacity all year round, helping all our child to benefit from this excellent resource.

### **Charity Collections**

Red Nose Day - £303.90 raised. £79 of which came from the cake sale.

After each of the Year 5 play performances, a collection was held for charity. This year, the children chose to give the money to The Rowing Marine - the first physically disabled person to row across the Atlantic, East to West, from mainland Europe to mainland South America. We followed Lee Spencer's progress in assemblies as he also successfully beat the able-bodied world record crossing. The money raised (£189.25) will go to his two designated charities: 'The Endeavour Fund' and 'The Royal Marines Charity'. It is hoped that one day he will be able to visit our school to share his amazing achievement.

We are hoping that these issues will be resolved during the Easter holidays, so that we can (finally!) open the bus up for use.
