# What has been happening in Years 3 & 4?

# Year 3

Since welcoming our Year 3s to the Juniors, we have had an extremely busy term.

In English, our topic of *The Lorax* allowed the children to think about important environmental questions. We thought about the characters of the Once-ler and the Lorax using drama, role play and debate. We then took to writing our own letters to the council to try and encourage them to cut down fewer trees.

In Geography, we have been exploring our local area and looking at how it has been changing. On our recent walk, we took surveys to consider the quality of our environment.

In Science, we were investigating rocks and soils. We carried out a variety of experiments to find how different rocks responded in different circumstances. We ended the topic by making some really effective fossils!

A real highlight of this half term has been our ambitious play, *Ebenezer*. Every child has put in an amazing effort to put the show together, from learning lines to painting scenery. Their hard work has really paid off and we're incredibly proud of their achievements. Putting on a school play is an important part of a child's education and incorporates so many of our Oaklands' Mindset, whether they have a speaking, non-speaking or technician's role. We choose an ambitious play so that they could challenge themselves and see what they could achieve together. Watching them collaborate and support each other has been fantastic. They have shown independence in learning their individual parts and it is clear when they sing their songs how much they have enjoyed putting on the production.

Our play gave us the opportunity to explore the classic Dickens' story, *A Christmas Carol.* The children put on their own shadow puppet performances based on the story.

We'd like to extend our sincere thanks to all the parents who have helped us in many ways this term.

# Year 4

It hardly seems possible that we are already at the end of the Autumn term!

The term was kicked off with a fantastic Roman Day, in which the children dressed up and fully embraced a day as a Roman citizen, including learning Roman numerals, making shields, playing Roman era games and a session as a Roman soldier (which included some VERY enthusiastic adults throwing objects at them!). The end of day feast was particularly lovely as it was great for the children to be able to share what they had been learning (and their pizzas!) with some of their adults.

One of the other highlights of the term was our visit to Camberley to watch 'Horrible Histories: Rotten Romans'. The children (and teachers!) thoroughly enjoyed watching this hilarious film which cemented some of their learning about the impact that the Romans had on Britain. As part of the history topic, the children got to make their very own Roman road, using a range of materials. The children have also been writing in role as a Roman soldier in battle against the Celts.

Recently, in English, the children have been reading The Iron Man by Ted Hughes and writing diary entries as if they were the main character. They have also been making up 'Iron Man' dances in true robotic style in PE.

In October, we had a lovely sunny day out at Wellington, where the children had the opportunity to learn more about harvest.

In science, the children have really enjoyed using the electrical circuits and we will be continuing this topic after the Christmas break, which will enable the children to build more complex circuits and test insulators & conductors.

In addition, we have been looking at lots of maps and atlases in geography and, more recently, started to learn about how we can be more sustainable. Next term, we are going to be studying how we can have a positive impact on the environment as individuals and as a school.

Thank you to all the volunteers that have helped on a weekly basis as well as those that have helped out a special events.

# What has been happening in Years 5 & 6?

# Year 5

Year 5 have had a busy and exciting term with the added responsibilities of being part of the Upper School including being playground friends and recycling monitors.

The term started off with reading 'There's a Boy in the Girls' Bathroom' as part of our English topic, which proved to be very popular amongst the children. They wrote fantastic formal letters in the role of different characters and finished off with a letter to the author of the book, Louis Sachar. We were particularly impressed with the high quality of their writing.

Our History topic involved learning about Mayan civilisation in Central America. The children used their investigation skills to gather information about the Mayan's occupations, ancient artefacts and ruins and to discover the reasons that they left their jungle cities. A highlight of the topic was designing, making and painting Mayan masks using Modroc. The finished masks looked extremely eye catching and creative- they were complimented by many members of staff and parents.

At the end of the half term, we concluded our Hinduism topic by celebrating Diwali Day. The children enjoyed preparing food for the feast, creating stick dances and painting Diva Lamps. The celebration at the end of the day was a wonderful opportunity for the children to share their work (and food!) with their parents. Thank you to everyone who helped and joined us for the occasion.

Our Science topic this half term has been Earth and Space. The children have shown a keen interest in learning about the Solar System including the history of Space travel. They have demonstrated their knowledge of the topic by producing detailed information texts about the planets, the Earth and the Moon. We finished the topic off with an action packed Space Day where the children graduated as astronauts and enjoyed participating in the Astronomy Roadshow.

# Year 6

Year 6 have had an excellent first term and have settled in well to being top of the school. They have taken on all the responsibilities we have asked of them with great maturity and diligence.

The highlight of our first term was undoubtedly the trip to Osmington Bay, where the children undertook several different challenges and activities.

We started off the term in English with descriptive writing influenced by the book 'Kensuke's Kingdom'. The children really enjoyed the novel and used imaginative and creative language in their work.

We linked the Geography topic of coastlines with our visit to Osmington Bay. To apply what we had learned in the classroom we took the children down to the beach and discussed erosion, rock formations and deposition with a geologist. In Computing, we used the programme 'Scratch' to create our own eroded coastline scenes.

In History we have been studying the famous story of the Trojan Horse. The children looked at several sources to decide whether the tale was fact or fiction. They finished off the unit by writing a balanced argument where they could express their final views.

To culminate our work on the Greeks we held a Greek Day where children made clay theatre masks, cooked Greek food and performed popular myths that they had learned about in English. The children have also written their own Greek Myths inspired by the many myths we read as a class.

Our Science topics this term have been based around the Biology units of Evolution and Inheritance & Animals and their Habitats. Among other lessons, the children enjoyed creating their own species of animal and designing their own human of the future.

We would like to extend our thanks to all the parents who helped this term. We wish all Year 6 and their families a Merry Christmas and a joyful New Year. We look forward to seeing you in the Spring Term.
